Bethlehem Christmas Carol

from the Rector's sabbatical

By the time our little band of pilgrim/tourists found our way to the little town of Bethlehem, we were already nearly exhausted from the first seven days of our adventures in the Holy Land. We had, by that time gotten to know Jerry, our guide very well, and had come to trust his candor and humor. But when we had negotiated the narrow streets of Bethlehem as far as the souvenir shop that Jerry assured us was trustworthy and fair and had done our shopping, he handed us over to others to see the sights we had come there to see.

The reason, Jerry said, was that our guides *pro tem*, being residents of that town, were far more qualified than he to help us negotiate the various sites. I suspect the actual reasons had to do with the politics of Bethlehem being pretty much the biggest Palestinian controlled tourist site in the Holy Land, and the related economic reality of having an occupying government control when the lifeblood tourism will be allowed or shut down altogether.

In any case, we disembarked the comfortable and commodious coach we had by then called home for a week and were crammed into a pair of vans and were whisked away to the Church of the Nativity, the church built on a church built on a shrine built on the spot that early Christians identified as having been the place where the eternal Christ was born of Mary to live and die as one of us. The line was long, the entrance to the shrine was downright treacherous, and our time in the silver—and gold-encrusted shrine itself was cramped and hurried. It was worth every bit of it.

In spite of our guide's incessant prodding, it took our group a long while to quit the Church and return to our little vans, and with some paying less than needful attention to which van they had been assigned, a bit *longer* to make sure we had all been accounted for, before we were hustled to Shepherds' Field where, it has been said for more centuries than we can imagine, that the angels called to shepherds abiding with their flocks their good news of great joy at the coming of the Son of God.

As we looked out over the chain-link and barbed-wire frontier between the West Bank and Israel proper and waited our turn behind some other, equally harried group of tourist/pilgrims, we were asked to imagine the cold night and the angels' song, "Glory to God in the highest..." Then in an obvious and oddly scripted way, our guide encouraged us to sing our own Christmas carol. Someone in our group eventually started *O Little Town...* or *It Came Upon a Midnight Clear...* or *O Come All Ye Faithful...* Whichever it was, the whole scene seemed so manufactured to me that it failed to mean much to me.

But as we were hustled back through the city and began to board our own coach, I found that I was indeed humming a song to myself. I didn't write it down—it wasn't that kind of moment—but I *think* the song that was stuck in my head as we headed back up the back side of Mt. Scopus toward our final overlook of Jerusalem, is one I learned as a boy, one that has been a blessing many times over the years:

Breathe on me, Breath of God, fill me with life anew, that I may love what thou dost love, and do what thou wouldst do.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, so shall I never die, but live with thee the perfect life of thine eternity.

I have a hard time, most of the time, following my own admonition in this regard, but I'm pretty sure that if we would pause long enough in the frenetic, all-too-often frantic busy-ness of this season to remember that the Incarnation was part of God's plan, that Christ became one of us, so that we could become a part of his eternal kingdom, part of the divine life itself.

As we begin a new cycle of the Church Year, as we move from Advent to Christmas and beyond let remember to sing the Christmas carols with which the Breath of God has filled our hearts/

Keep Awake!

from the Deacon

I decided to take a break from my usual writing of the Holy Land Travels because I believe that Advent is an important liturgical season for us to observe. Advent begins the Church's new year and our readings switch to year A. The first Sunday of Advent the Advent wreath will be set-up and someone will light the first candle, the candle for Hope.

Most Episcopalians do not need to be told to "keep awake" during Advent. Most of us are already operating in a state of sleep deprivation because we're too busy rushing around town or going to Evansville to get the best sale prices we can get. Plus, we're busy decorating the Christmas trees and wrapping gifts, planning the Christmas meals and who to invite to the many Christmas parties!

These days we are startled into extra hours of wakefulness in a liturgical season that annoyingly presumes we might be asleep! With all there is to get ready for the holidays, nobody needs to tell us to "keep awake!" As Advent progresses, the number of shopping days left before the big day offers a countdown that stresses us out and keeps us up way too late. But let me be clear that while the world's business may seem to be geared toward a commercialized Christmas, it seldom mentions or recognizes the importance of Christ' birth or His return.

But we have a loving God who forgives and understands. In Advent, we are indeed asleep to much of what matters, I fear. We as Christians are like people who have lived by the train tracks for years, who no longer hear the sound of the train. After years of attending Church, we have gotten use to the noise of Advent, to the coming of Christ, that we no longer notice it? Or if we do notice, it has ceased to jolt us awake because too many of us are still asleep in our beds on Sunday morning.

I urge you, keep awake don't miss the opportunity in the season of Advent that might have been most obvious and important at one time in your life, the coming of Christ. The return of the Advent season is full of delight and wonder as the purple color is used inside the sanctuary and the Advent Wreath appears! The four candles on the Advent wreath represent hope, peace, joy, and love. The center candle represents the light of Christ who has come into the world!

We should not let Advent slip away, only to realize that we spent it asleep! There is still time to encounter the presence of Christ in our waking hours. This Advent, Jesus is urging us to live as if His return were just around the corner! So, there is no time to nod off in the recliner or to be browsing on the web. We are to be attentive to the signs of His presence around us, because, indeed, He has already arrived. The story of Advent is the story of Emmanuel, "God with us!" Amen
