Why Ask Why?

from the Rector's sabbatical

On the last Sunday before my sabbatical, rather than a homily, I dragged a chair to the center of the Nave and answered questions about what I hoped to accomplish with the period of refreshment so generously provided by our Parish. I also asked a couple of questions of my own, and asked members to continue to consider those questions in my absence.

That challenge itself was a continuation of the questions I urged us to engage back at this time last year. Based on conversations I have had with many Parishioners about changing patterns of participation, I asked: what is most important about St. Paul's to each of us, how St. Paul's can meet our needs, corporately and individually, and how each of us can be more involved in the life we share.

On the eve of my absence from you for three month. I asked us to consider how St. Paul's is distinct from other churches and service organizations, that is, how are we set apart in our community. And I asked what we could be doing better, and what, if it were absent would change the essential character of St. Paul's.

I received some very helpful answers from small groups, the Vestry, the Wednesday evening crowd, and the saints, sinners and cynics that meet on Tuesdays at Rookies. But my goal of getting to ask the questions more personally were a casualty of complications in my own personal life, and the easel charts I set in the Parish Hall for comment went all but unnoticed during the sabbatical.

Then at Annual Convention in November, a new program was launched for the Diocese of Kentucky based on a popular TED talk by corporate consultant, Simon Sinek, who proposes that organizations refocus their attention and their actions from questions about what, where and how they do the things they do, with the passion behind the more basic question of why?

A committee from the Bishop and Trustees, the body for executive governance of the Diocese, led a three-part Convention session that asked delegates, seated

at mixed tables rather than with their own deputations, to consider the "why?" of our Diocesan life.

I was somewhat surprised to find the exercise to be very valuable, and I hope we can capture part of the energy that was generated in the Diocesan context for our own life here at St. Paul's. As we continue to look at what we do as a Parish, and how we could do it better, we would do well to base those conversations on the why, on the passion that we have for this place, for each other, and for our common life in Christ.

As a starting point for such a sustained and fruitful conversation, I am going to use a part of our Annual Meeting after Eucharist on Sunday, January 12 for an abbreviated version of our Diocesan exercise. I will, of course, present the basic whats and hows of the year we have just completed. But I look forward, as well, to having us begin to ask why it is that we all are committed, in many different ways, to being the presence of Christ here on the corner of Center and Green.

From there, I'm planning to take the conversation to the pulpit and on the road. For the three Sundays following our Meeting, I will share my own whys: in a formula with which many of you are fairly familiar after nearly eight years together, talking about why I am a Christian, why I am a priest, and finally, why I am your Priest.

At the same time, I will be asking *you* the same sort of questions: why you are a Christian, why you are at St. Paul's, why you are as active as you are (or not), and I hope that I will get invitations from some of you for such conversations. For others, I hope you will answer my call to set up a time for us to talk. Either way, I look forward to sharing our Annual Meeting whys in this space next month, and I look forward just as eagerly to sharing the whys of the rest of our conversations before we reach the deliberation of our Lenten journey.

Holy Land Travels—Part 7

from the Deacon

I had just finished my eggplant and egg sandwich when Jerry announced it was time to go, we had a long afternoon of driving to get to our next hotel. Our driver Ruben drove through the Jordan Valley while Jerry pointed out places of interest, including the ruins of the ancient city of Jericho.

As we continued driving through the Jordan Valley there was a lot of agriculture, in the desert. The temperature in the desert was an unseasonable 105 degrees, and our air-conditioning wasn't cooling the coach. So, after a couple hours, folks began to complain. We were about 45 minutes from our hotel so Jerry decided to stop so Ruben could look at the air-conditioning unit while we walked about a quarter mile to a water fall there in the desert! I was not a happy camper!

We loaded back onto the hot coach and drove a short distance to an Ahava factory outlet for some shopping and a restroom break, which I badly needed! Unfortunately, I found this particular bathroom to be very undesirable and smelly!

After about thirty minutes, we boarded the coach again, and headed for the Daniel Dead Sea Hotel, only about thirty minutes away. Hurray! By now I was not feeling well at all, my lunch having not set well with me. Upon arriving to the hotel, Jerry explained that arrangements were already made to have our coach airconditioning repaired by a mechanic during our stay there.

I was unable to walk down to the Dead Sea and get into the water, instead I watched from my window as Lydia and Kyle bravely enjoyed the salty waters of the Dead Sea. I had ordered a soda similar to a sprite and a glass of ice to help settle my stomach. The hotel sent my sprite and ice right up! The cost was 28 New Israeli Shekels (with tip), a little over eight dollars, but worth every penny to me. I took a short nap and got up feeling much better. I showered for supper and met the others in the dining room at 7:00, but decided to eat light and return to my room early. I was totally worn out!

The next morning, day five of our trip, we loaded onto the coach which had been repaired and rode a short distance to Masada. Masada is the name for the site of the ancient palace and fortification in the Southern District of Israel. It perches on top of an isolated rock plateau on the eastern edge of the Judaean Desert, overlooking the Dead Sea. We rode a cable car to the top of the mountain and toured the extensive ruins, well preserved by the dry desert air. According to the information on the signs, Herod the Great built two palaces for himself on the mountain and fortified Masada. Later, Masada was the last stronghold of the 73-74 C.E. Jewish rebellion against the Romans, which ended in the mass suicide of the rebels who were there.

I will stop here and continue next month with the ruins of Masada as we walked through this ancient site.

Annual Parish Meeting




New Letter from Uganda

How are you? Me I am doing well. My family






Going to school has helped me to learn to read and write. I have also learnt many other things. Just recently we have learnt about physical features vectors and others. I didn't know about them.

- Firmed up plans for the meal and program at Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 12.
- Discussed the expansion of WiFi service to aid in live streaming our worship, and the usefulness of Fr. Rich's broadcast calls for reminding Parishioners of coming activities.
- Applauded the generous crowd of children who were part of our annual St. Nicholas celebration, including many who are not usually part of our Parish but are *friends* of Parishioners.
