My Holy Land Experience

Sometimes when I take a trip, the memories I make and the lessons I learn are different than what I had anticipated. My trip to Israel in May was no different. I had expectations that were met, in so many wonderful ways, but I also returned home thinking about things I hadn't expected.

One reason I went on the trip was to gain a deeper understanding of the Bible and ancient Israel. I'm a very visual and tactile person, so I learn best though experiences. I now know how the Romans conquered the last of the Jews holding out at the ancient fortress of Masada in the year 73 AD. They built a ramp out of rock, still visible today, to help them scale the cliff. I don't think I'll ever forget what that ramp looked like, or the remains of the Roman camps that circled the fortress. I also saw the Sea of Galilee and was surprised at its size. It's not as big as what I had expected. I stood on one side looking at the mountain range on the other and could visualize Jesus walking along the shores calling out to the fishermen to "follow me."

So many of these and other stories I've read have been brought to life after my trip. I followed the route Jesus took when he rode the colt and wept as he approached Jerusalem. I stood near the area where tradition tells us Jesus spent his final hours in the Garden of Gethsemane before being taken prisoner. The sites and city look different today, of course. The elevation of the city has risen as each conquering nation destroyed and then rebuilt on top of the rubble. The unmistakable Dome of the Rock, plainly visible from the Mount of Olives, wasn't around during Jesus' time either. I imagine the topography to be nearly the same, however, and archeologists continue to uncover areas that were from Jesus' time. So it wasn't hard for me to feel as if I had been transported back to that era.

I also took the trip hoping it would strengthen my faith and draw me closer to God. I visited Joppa, Caesarea, Bethlehem, Tiberius, Jerusalem, and more, all cities that were before only words on a page. In a way I was like a "doubting Thomas." I needed to see these places in person to understand at a deeper level that they were real. It's hard for me to comprehend a place that's on the other side of the world.

I would like to return to Israel one day and see the sites that I missed. I still don't understand all that I read, and I know I have room to grow in my faith. But returning isn't necessary. Hearing a volunteer curator read from the Bible at one of sites we visited reminded me of that. We were visiting the Garden Tomb where some people believe Jesus was buried and rose. "He is not here, but has risen," the volunteer read. I've thought a lot about that passage since returning, something I hadn't expected. You don't need to go to Israel to experience Jesus. He's here. He's here when we visit a sick friend. He's here when we give someone a ride, call a parent, walk someone's dog, babysit, help with someone's bill. The list of things we can do to show our love for our neighbor is endless. Visiting Israel was nice, and I saw many sites I had only dreamt about. But seeking the living Christ is better. That's what I want to remember most.
