So far, things seem to be going well - from the success of the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper to the number of you attending Sunday services.


This season of Lent will be busy as

### AML, Not an Easy Journey

from the Deacon

Fifth day, it is Friday morning five o'clock and I can't go back to sleep, I had just made a cup of coffee when it started raining. I took my coffee and morning medicines to take and walked to the couch in the living room. We didn't have to be at the clinic until 9:30 am. I did my morning prayers and finished my coffee before the alarm woke up Michael at seven am.

I had taken a pill for nausea earlier so I would be able to eat breakfast. The nausea was really bad but the pill took care of it. Michael fixed us scrambled eggs, bacon, and toast with peach jelly I had made last year. The rain was really coming down when we sat down to eat breakfast. Michael turned on the TV to get a weather report. The rain wouldn't be ending until mid afternoon! I remarked that it looks like we'll have to take the car today. I sure didn't feel like walking.

I took my shower while Michael washed the dishes and made the beds. He was a wonderful caregiver and house maid! We left at 9:10 am and arrived at the clinic on the second floor at 9:30 on the dot. I checked in, received my wrist band and room number before I stepped on the scale to weigh. I weighed 166 pounds, oops! Lost a couple pounds. They do not want me losing any weight! Oh well, guess I didn't drink enough water! We were assigned room twenty, no recliner just a bed and chair for Michael.

I was glad to lay down on the bed, my nausea was back. The aid came in and took my vitals and asked me what my weight was for that morning. Then she asked how much water I drank the last twenty four hours. I told her I believed it was two liters I reported that I had nausea when I got up that morning, so I took my pill before eating.

Ten minutes later my nurse, Kathy, entered the room to take blood from me. She filled twelve little tubes from me. Kathy asked how bad my nausea was? I remarked I feel like vomiting if that's any indication how bad it is. She immediately gave me something in my IV for the nausea. Kathy came back fifteen minutes later to let me know my blood labs indicated that I was low on potassium and magnesium. So, I was given a potassium pill and Kathy started the magnesium infusion into my IV, I needed two bags of the magnesium. That kept us there two more hours.

Dr. Kassim came into the room around 1:30, asking how his number one patient was doing. I replied I have had better days! He grins and told Michael to stop at the Pharmacy on our way home to pick up a prescription of penicillin with potassium. I complained that's all I need one more pill to take! He just laughed and said see you tornorrow Mr. Larry!
